The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the overning document, the Charities Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

#### Structure, governance and management

UK Deaf Sport is constituted under a charitable trust deed on 14 June 2003 and re-adopted on 9 September 2006.

Trustees are appointed at the Annual General Meeting. All Trustees are provided with a copy of the Memorandom and Articles of Association and are brought up to date on the charity's activities to date.

None of the Trustees has any beneficial interest in the Charity. The charity does, however, have a working relationship with Deaf Direct a charity of which P Gerrard is Chief Executive and Company Secretary. Details of transactions between the two entities are contained in the notes to the financial statements.

The Trustees have considered the major risks faced by the charity and have improved the methods used to monitor risks. A comprehensive risk register was developed and identified the major risks facing the charity. It described and evaluated the steps to be taken to manage those risks and provided an action plan to address the improvements required. Further work is intended during 2013-14 to introduce a simple traffic light system for this register for use at the regular board meetings.

#### Objectives and activities

As the recognised Strategic Lead Agency for Sport in the UK. The Principal Objectives of the Organisation are:

The relief of sport related persons who are deaf or hard of hearing and who are resident in the United Kingdom ("the area of benefit") in all or any of the following ways:

The promotion of equality and diversity by facilitating the participation of the beneficial class in sport; and

The encouragement of participation of sport by members of the beneficial class as means of relieving or overcoming their disabilities.

UK Deaf Sport is a registered charity; the Board of Trustees oversee the work and day to day management whilst staff are recruited to specific projects. The Board are kept fully informed of all relevant operational information via meetings, sub-committees and written briefings. The organisation continues to work within its set of 'Vision and Values'.

#### Vision

"more deaf people participating and reaching their full potential in sport"

#### Mission statement

"create a world leading system for deaf people to participate and succeed in sport"

#### Values

honest, transparent, inclusive, respectful, passionate, and reliable.

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit, 'Charities and Public Benefit'. Public benefit requirements are satisfied by UK Deaf Sport aiming to enable Deaf people to benefit from, excel at and fulfil their potential through sport of their chosing.

#### Achievements and performance

#### 1. Resources secured

To build on the successful project funding of £285,000 UK Deaf Sport secured last year to address the need to increase participation opportunities available to the deaf community, we have not sat back and rested. During 2012-13 we have gone on to secure a further £135,000 to help create a better system and support to our elite Sports Men and Women through a National Talent Development project.

#### 2. Governance Improvements

Through 2012/13 our Trustees have used the Culture and Sport Improvement Toolkit (CSIT) to help us assess our strengths and weaknesses. This has led to the creation of a 4 year Strategic Plan to build upon the Improvement Journey of 2011/12 in which the areas of leadership, business planning and stratergy, partnership working, resource development, fundraising, capacity building, and performance measurement were developed.

- A Delivery Plan has been written for 2013-14 to monitor the progress of the Strategic Plan, and priorities for the year have been developed. UK Deaf Sport will need to undergo reorganisation to be able to deliver this strategy. We are committed to achieving our goals where we have the resources to do so.
- Through the development work we have been undertaking over the last year to improve our governance structures we are now looking to sign up to the Voluntary Code of Good Governance for the Sports and Recreation Sector. This gives the tools to lead and manage an organisation so that is creates, maintains and improves the structure and environment in which deaf sport and physical activity is delivered; this will help us to ensure legal obligations are met and appropriate policies are in place, putting our organisation in a position to control and plan for the future in a sustainable way, and imbedding structures, processes, systems and behaviours to help us run better.

#### 3. Organisational restructure

Following the review through CSIT and the development of a strategic plan. At the later end of 2012 the board decided to undertake a restructure of the business in light of the priorities and additional funding secured through the Talent fund. This process was to ensure that we had a staffing structure suitable to push the organisation forward and to secure the necessary professional experience and knowledge in key staff. The result of this review was that the previous National Inclusive Sport Advisor post was to be made redundant and three new posts created.

- Director Of Development: this position was created to provide a strategic lead officer that could continue the
  work on governance and funding as well as manage a staff team to achieve the outcomes and objective of the
  strategy and business plan
- National Participation Officer: this would replace the Inclusive advisor and lead the participation increasing
  work across key areas of the country
- National Talent Officer: this role was to look at developing stronger and more supportive pathways for our talented athletes enabling them to reach their full potential through sport

The aim will be to implement this structure starting in June 2013 with funding currently secured up to Dec 2014.

#### 4. Inclusive Sport

The project to increase the participation opportunities across the country continued to make strong links with partner organisation and National Governing Bodies of Sport to influence them to ensure that there provision is inclusive and accessible for deaf people. This project was effected slightly be the need to develop the strategy however several sport have benefited from the advice and support provided by UK Deaf Sport over the past years. The outcome of this support has seen many new resources available in the form of factsheets and guidance on how to make your sport accessible and deaf friendly in Athletics, Football, Netball, Rowing, Squash, Swimming, Tennis. The project has also worked with Badminton, Basketball, Cycling and Golf,

In addition to the work undertaken with specific Sport the project has been able to develop two mayor national resources with Sport Coach UK

- A Deaf and Hard of Hearing Factsheet for Coaches: this is now available for all coaches to use providing guidance and tips of how to adapt your coaching style to support a deaf participant in there session
- "Effective Communication" workshop: from April 2013 there will be nationally recognised training courses for sport that looks to train coaches, Official and other club personnel in how to communicate effectively with deaf or hard of hearing participant. This is a huge development for deaf sport and will see many more clubs with the skills and understanding to ensure there activities are deaf friendly. A significant priority has been placed on promoting and delivering a series of courses in 2013. The course will also be delivered by Deaf tutors which will make the educational experience even greater.

UK Deaf Sport remains committed to increasing participation at a community level and this will continue to be the largest part of our work over the coming years. We continue to push to create more opportunity for more people at all level to enjoy the benefits of sport and a healthy lifestyle

#### 5. Talent & Deaflympics 2013

UK Deaf Sport were successful in securing £134,620 from Sport England for the period 01/09/12 – 31/03/14 for a Talent & Deaflympics project. The bulk of the funding will be used to appoint a full time National Talent Officer that will look to work with National Governing Bodies of Sport and our Deaf Sport Organisation to establish a stronger, fairer and more effective talent development programme that will ensure that deaf people have the opportunity to excel in sport with the appropriate support. This officer will link strongly into our existing Participation programme to increase the understanding and access to a pool of potentially talented athelets. In additions to this role the funds will also be used for the following purposes

- To appoint a part time administrator to support the Volunteer Sofia lead trustee ensuring that the logistical elements of the project can be managed swiftly and effectively
- To secure the services of a professional PR agency to help raise the profile of the Deaflympics and the challenges faced by deaf people in sport before, during and after the event.
- As a result of this grant all athletes and officials attending this year Deaflympics will be paying a reduced amount and some of the central administration fees and cost that previously would have needed to be covered by athletes contribution will be paid by the grant itself.

# TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2013

It is hoped that through utilising the funding in this way and looking at the long term aim of support all our deaf elite sports people to compete we will be able to have a longer lasting effect and benefit many generations to come.

Despite the increased capacity that we will be gaining through this recruitment process, UK Deaf Sport remains a very much voluntary lead organisation and this will remain so for many years to come. Therefore the Sofia 2013 subcommittee will be responsible for the overall general organisation and administration of the GB Team to ensure they were the best prepared GB Team to participate in the Deaflympics.

#### 6. Sports Science Committee (SSC)

The SSC was formed to advise UK Deaf Sport and provide expertise for all National Deaf Sport Organisations and NGBs for their future work by establishing sports science support infrastructure, processes, procedures and systems to help deaf athletes achieve world-class performance standards. Meeting of the Committee have taken place throughout the year, and regular reports have been provided to the Board. The main focus of the committe has been to secure the services of an expert team of volunteers that will support the athletes at this year Deaflympics. The groups commitment, hard works and determination will mean that this year we will be taking our biggest Medical team with us to Sofia to ensure that the athletes have the best possible support in their quest for medals.

#### 7. International Representation

As part of our plan to have sufficient influence at the international level, Board members have maintained an international prescence, representing Britain at the European Deaf Sport Organisation (EDSO) 16th Congress in Moscow in June 2012 and within the EDSO Legal Commission.

#### Financial review

We are pleased to confirm for this whole year an income of £165,175 was achieved. This is offset by the expenditure for the whole financial year to the sum of £131,278. This gives us a surplus of £33,897 for the year, which when added to the balance brought forward of £31,969, gives us a total reserves balance of £65,866 as at 31st March 2013.

The costs cuts made this year and last have resulted in a reduction of general unrestricted costs to an absolute minimum, using volunteers and not requiring office space. Therefore this coming year's lack of predicted income does not carry significant threat as all necessary provision is in place to operate within our means.

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees considers that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised.

#### Plans for the future

- The Board intends to sign up to the Voluntary Code of Good Governance for the Sports and Recreation Sector.
- UK Deaf Sports needs to reorganise to be able to deliver its 4 year strategy.
- We are committed to reaching our goals, but to do this we need to increase our resources. We recognise we
  will have to be more efficient and more entrepreneurial and raise more money to help our work.

## NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2013

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### 1,1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Charities Act 2006.

#### 1.2 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA on a receivable basis.

#### 1.3 Resources expended

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis

Costs of generating funds are costs that directly relate to obtaining and administering donations received.

Expenditure is categorised as charitable in furtherance of the charitable company's objects if it is directly attributable to achieving the objects of the charitable company.

Remaining expenditure is analysed as governance costs as they represent the unavoidable costs of the charitable company not directly involved in generating income.

#### 1.4 Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction.

#### 1.5 Accumulated funds

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.
