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TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2017.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016).

Objectives and activities

UK Deaf Sport (UKDS) exists to encourage every deaf person to be active and inspired by sport. It aims to achieve this by leading opportunities for more deaf people to participate in sport and physical activity throughout their lives and more deaf athletes to perform on the world stage.

UKDS was established in 2003 and has been a member of the International Committee of Sports for the Deaf (ICSD) since March 2006. UKDS is a member of the UK Council on Deafness (UKCoD) and the English Federation of Disability Sports (EFDS).

UKDS has a Strategic Plan, developed to achieve the vision of "Every Deaf Person Active and Inspired by Sport". The Plan revolves around three key Strategic Objectives and associated outcomes:

Leadership – strategic, well governed leadership for deaf sport.

Participation – more deaf people trying, playing & supporting sport.

Performance – more deaf athletes winning medals on the world stage.

UKDS is grateful for the support of its partners, specifically Sport England, but is acutely aware of its commitment to reduce the reliability on the public purse and to ensure the sustainability of the organisation.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Leadership

This last year has been the first full year of operation for UKDS as it moved from a Charity to Charitable Company. This transition has seen significant changes to the governance of the organisation, specifically to the Board, strategy, structure and staffing.

The Board has been strengthened by an open recruitment process, adding expertise in line with the new strategic direction. UKDS continues to work towards developing a balanced Board that represents the membership and provides the right skills to lead and govern the organisation.

The new strategy has led to a shift in structure and the Board has looked to bridge the gap with the Executive and ensure alignment between the strategic direction of UKDS and operational delivery. Three members of staff have moved on from UKDS and this has presented an opportunity to consolidate delivery. The appointment of a Head of Participation, Valerie Copenhagen, to lead this core area is fundamental to the success of the organisation.

This role has also worked with Sport England to ensure the continuation of important funding which will see an increase in participation amongst the deaf and hard of hearing.

Participation

Research and Insight

Following the completion of the 2015 National Participation Survey, UKDS carried out research understanding the barriers faced by deaf people participating in sport. This research has now been completed and is available on our UKDS Website. Recommendations from this research have been included within the Participation area of work at UKDS.

UKDS has commissioned Skyblue to carry out research and insight into the behaviours and attitudes of deaf people and sport. This research will be completed November 2017. The findings and recommendations will be invaluable to our work looking at raising participation figures of deaf people in England.

Deafinitely Inclusive

With a change in the organisation's strategy, the appointment of the new Head of Participation and feedback from our partners, much of the existing participation programmes and areas of work were reviewed and recommendations given on how to take these areas further. As a result the focus of the Deafinitely Inclusive programme, accreditation and networks has changed. The learning, resources and contacts gained through this area of work have now been absorbed into other areas of work.

Guidance

We continue to work with individual sports and their National Governing Bodies to identify ways to embed deaf inclusive/awareness information and guidance for their clubs within their own club marks.

UKDS continues to support and work alongside EFDS in particular providing deaf inclusive guidance for the Sport England Quest initiative.

Sensory Alliance

UKDS has made great strides in our work with British Blind Sport (BBS) in building a Sensory Alliance to support deaf and visually impaired people within sport and physical activity. This work is essential in helping tackle the barriers faced by those with sensory impairments which currently contribute to preventing over 90% engaging in regular activity.

New Areas of Working

We continue to identify new ways of working and new partners to approach in terms of engaging with deaf people in sport and physical activity. Included within this is a new pilot 8 week angling programme delivered by Angling Unlimited. The programme will engage with 15-20 deaf young people.

Effective Communication Course

UKDS continued to work with sports coach UK to promote and deliver 'Effective Communication: Coaching Deaf People in Sport' courses. This year four courses have been delivered reaching 34 coaches/members involved in sport and physical activity. An overall evaluation was carried out in December 2016 looking into the course and the participants who had accessed it. The results and recommendations will help shape how we take this course further over the next couple of years.

Marketing and Communications

We have worked with EFDS and other National Disability Sports Organisations (NDSOs) to deliver joint marketing. We continue to update and improve the UKDS website and CRM system to manage our contacts and to gather information to help provide insight for partners.

Performance

The focus of this strategic area has been the complex preparations for the DeaflympicsGB mission to Sansum, Turkey for the Deaflympics in the summer of 2017. Unlike Team GB and ParalympicsGB, Deaf athletes are not recognised and supported by government and UKDS has worked hard to identify partners to help assist athletes and ensure that they are supported as they train for the Deaflympics. The aim of DeaflympicsGB has been to create "One Team" from all of the sports and to generate a step change in performance culture, with a focus on the podium.

Financial review

The charity has been successful in delivering activities to the deaf through funding from Sport England. The result for the year shows a surplus of £7,262 (2016 - period, deficit £22,729).

Restricted funds stand at £31,679 with a deficit in general reserves of £2,059.

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees considers that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has not yet been achieved, efforts are continuing to secure funding to be able to continue to deliver the service required in the sector.

Principal sources of income

The principal source of income for the year has been the funding awarded by Sport England. A successful bid was submitted for further funding resulting in a further two year project to be undertaken.

Custodian

The charity has acted in a custodial capacity on behalf of other Deaf Sport organisations for the collection of sponsorship monies (the facility ceased in August 2017). Such monies received are segregated in a separate bank account.

Risk assessment

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, a comprehensive risk register is in place and clearly identifies the major risks facing the charity. It describes and evaluates the steps to be taken to manage those risks and provides an action plan to address any improvements required.

Plans for the future

Whilst this year has seen much change, UKDS completes its full first year as a Charitable Company in good shape to deliver on its mission and work towards its vision.

Under our Leadership objective, our governance work continues to establish a transparent structure and build a balanced Board with the right skills to grow the organisation and ensure continued sustainability.

Much of the focus of next year under our Participation objective will be in ensuring work develops with Sport England, EFDS and other key partners.

Supporting DeaflympicsGB to the Deaflympics in Turkey 2017 is the prime objective of Performance for this coming year and to ensure a safe and medal laden return from our athletes. Our work to secure financial support and recognition from the private sector and from Government continues.

Linked to the Deaflympics is our International Strategy, which will be reviewed post Deaflympics with the aim of strengthening our position on the world stage, specifically to support a level playing field with anti-doping and audiology work.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee.

The Board of Trustees oversee the work and day to day management whilst staff are recruited to specific projects. The Board are kept fully informed of all relevant operational information via meetings, sub committees and written briefings. The organisation continues to work within its set of 'Vision and Values'.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

UK Deaf Sport is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is 3 Oakwood Drive, Loughborough, Leicestershire, LE11 3QF.

1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \pounds .

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Grant income is recognised upon receipt unless it is event or performance specific when it is recognised at the time of the event to which it relates or the required performance criteria are met.

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for as soon as a legal obligation exists for the payment of funds in respect of goods or services received.

Expenditure is allocated to activities on a fund by fund basis.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks.

1.7 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors are initially recognised at transaction price. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.8 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.9 Comparatives

Comparatives where shown relate to the two month period ended 31 March 2016.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
